-Isaiah 64:1



Advent begins with the pleading voice of the prophet Isaiah. “O, that You would tear open the heavens and come down, that the mountains would quake at your presence!” You can sense in this vivid and demanding language the deep desire and holy impatience of the prophet. He wants God’s transforming presence to come and change everything - not someday, not tomorrow, but NOW.

What are the longings of your heart? Where do you deeply desire God’s transforming presence to come, now? Advent is a season to voice the tension between the world as it is and the world as it is meant to be, to dwell in the promises of our faith, and to place our trust in God. Placing our trust in God means being in real relationship, where we share our longings, our anger, our pain and heartache – and demand: Ceasefire in Gaza, now! Healing and hope for our neighbors in Camp Nenookaasi - now! Reconciliation in our personal relationships – now! Peace in our hearts – now! O, that You would tear open the heavens and come down, that our world, our city, our neighborhood, our church, and our very bodies would quake at your presence, and be mended by your peace!

In Advent we draw close to the mystery of the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ. In Jesus, God indeed comes down. God pitches God’s tent, setting up a divine encampment among us. God hears and responds to our cries and our pleading – for God’s kingdom to come and will to be done, on earth as in heaven. Now. Together, may we keep awake and vigilant for the ways the kingdom of God is emerging, even in our heartache – perhaps, especially there.

An Introduction to the Our Saviour's Lutheran Church (OSLC) Foundation

Purpose: The Foundation was established to provide a permanent way for members and friends to benefit the ministry of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church through memorials, bequests and similar financial gifts. The Foundation supports OSLC ministries and other charitable work in the community.

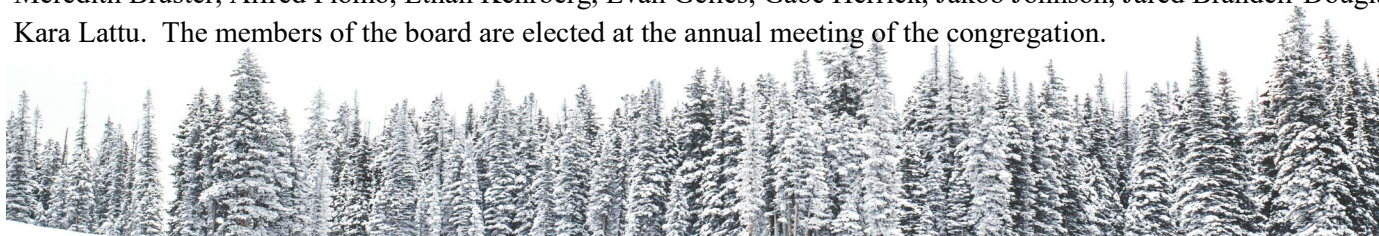
History: The Foundation was established in 1963. Over the years, the Foundation has provided critical financial resources to the church and other nonprofit organizations. The Foundation has provided loans to OSLC for unexpected big expenses.

What it does for OSLC: The Foundation supports the ministries of OSLC by providing funds directly to the Our Saviour's Lutheran Church budget. The amount varies each year; ranging from \$39,000-\$42,000.

How it works: It is separately incorporated and is managed by the Foundation Board of Directors. The Foundation invests primarily in the Ministry Growth Fund of the ELCA which is a long-term, socially responsible fund. The Foundation also invests in the Mission Investment Fund, a financial ministry of the ELCA.

Future: The Foundation board is currently discerning its role in the community while continuing to support the ministries of OSLC. The board is exploring how our work might best help to transform the structures of underlying racial, economic, and other forms of injustice.

Who: The Foundation board of directors include: Bob Hybben, Paul Batalden, Mike Troutman, Linda Thorson, Meredith Bruster, Alfred Flomo, Ethan Kehrberg, Evan Gelles, Gabe Herrick, Jakob Johnson, Jared Brandell-Douglas, Kara Lattu. The members of the board are elected at the annual meeting of the congregation.

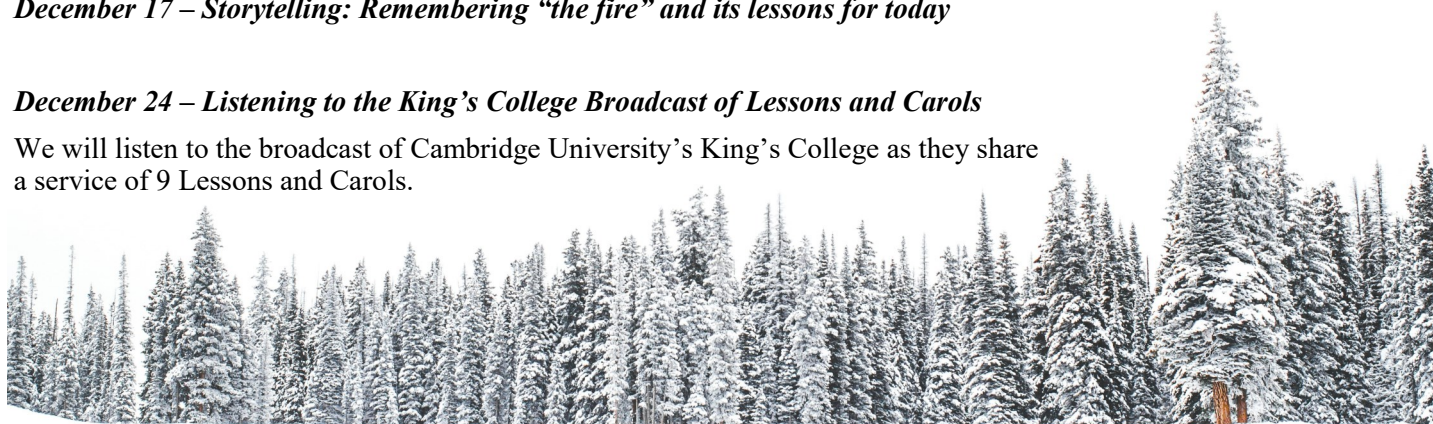

Mission of the Month - Helping Hands Fund

Supporting members, neighbors and Camp Nenookaasi with basic needs

Our Helping Hands Fund is the mission of the month.

This fund is used at the discretion of the pastors for folks who come to our doors – whether members or neighbors - with particular financial needs. Now that we have developed a relationship with Camp Nenookaasi encampment down the street, we are also using Helping Hands money to support those neighbors and their needs. In the last week, we have purchased gloves, socks, and fuel. Over the last year, we have helped several people with things like rent assistance, hotel stays for people experiencing housing instability, medical bills, transportation for a family emergency, and income assistance from loss of work.

We are not a social service agency, but sometimes people fall through the cracks of our systems, and we are a compassionate place to turn. When we give, the gift of money is accompanied by a listening, compassionate ear; prayer, and invitation to Christian community (as appropriate).

Thanks in advance for your generosity and for the mercy and compassion that flows from our God to those in need.

Grant Stevensen's Non-Stipendiary Call

In November, Grant Stevensen received a non-stipendiary call to serve as an ELCA pastor assisting at Our Saviour's from the Minneapolis Area Synod council, at the request of the OSLC church council. This means that the work Grant has already been doing around Our Saviour's – including leading trainings on faith and organizing for our congregational inreach (January 2023) and neighborhood inreach (Spring 2023), leading a book study (summer 2023), and preaching periodically constitutes a call in the ELCA.

It is non-stipendiary – meaning, Grant is not receiving a salary for this work, though we may occasionally pay stipends for particular services (like leading trainings). Grant has also been supporting Phillips neighborhood pastors in gathering periodically to see how we can work together to address needs in the neighborhood, and through this non-stipendiary call, his gifts in faith and organizing might be called upon from some of our neighborhood churches. Grant has other paid sources of income, but he needs to be serving in a congregational context as well to maintain his clergy status. Because the call is non-stipendiary, the call is through the synod, not through our congregation (hence, we had no congregational meetings or vote).

I recognize some of this might sound confusing and church-jargony. The bottom line is in the second sentence above – the call is a way to honor the work Grant is already doing among us as the work of rostered clergy.

A Christmas Chain Reaction Prayer

I write as the slaughter of innocents bombardment of Gaza is suspended for yet another day... on the anniversary of the award of the Nobel Peace Prize to a MN farm kid who grew to orchestrate the world declaring war illegal. This noble effort is still in progress. God keeps pushing us to try again.

Imagine this: Day by day, the Gaza slaughter is postponed while prisoners are released by Israel and Hamas. The world sees the harm war has done to people and planet in Gaza and Ukraine. "What sense does this make?" the people ask. "Everybody loses." A moral shift against funding war starts to take place.

The two Christian (claimed) nations, Ukraine and Russia, recognizing their joint commitment to neighbor love as Christians, declare a truce in honor of Jesus's birth. They even agree to celebrate all the different days identified as Christmas! Mothers get to re-unite with their conscripted adult children who will be sent home! During this truce, Ukraine and Russia commit to negotiating a lasting peace that is best for their nations and the shared planet. The children and all the plants and animals and other living beings sing for joy.

This startling declaration inspires the current Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) negotiations happening in New York City. There's an upswelling of nuclear nation citizen awareness that nuclear weapons spending is a death spiral activity. The current wars themselves demonstrate the absurdity of the deterrence excuse for building bombs. What is the sense of building something that "should never be used" but continually pollutes and threatens?

Within the TPNW framework, anything associated with nuclear weapons is now illegal. The trillions of dollars and scientific expertise allocated to this enterprise – which is actually now prohibited – is available to be re-purposed to the shared global threat of climate catastrophe. The children and all the plants and animals and other living beings sing for joy.

Conveniently, the Conference of Parties (COP28) to the Climate Convention is meeting in Dubai. COP28 recognizes the huge greenhouse gas emissions of war-making--and nuclear war preparation in particular. The conference notes and condemns the entwinement of national security with the control and development of fossil fuels. They agree to save the future of humanity on the planet by making the arms industry illegal. The children and all the plants and animals and other living beings sing for joy.

Now the focus shifts on converting warheads to windmills. Imagine aircraft carriers being converted to homes for refugees from islands periodically flooded by rising oceans. The nearly 900 US military bases are converted to provide low-income housing. The economic stimulation also mitigates immigration pressures on our borders. Within the US, converted military bases usually also include addiction treatment centers. Now there is funding for not just intervening in the social determinants of poverty and addiction but for research breakthroughs in addiction interventions! The children and all the plants and animals and other living beings sing for joy.

By February, the planet can breathe again... children will be less afraid of our future. That's all I want for Christmas.

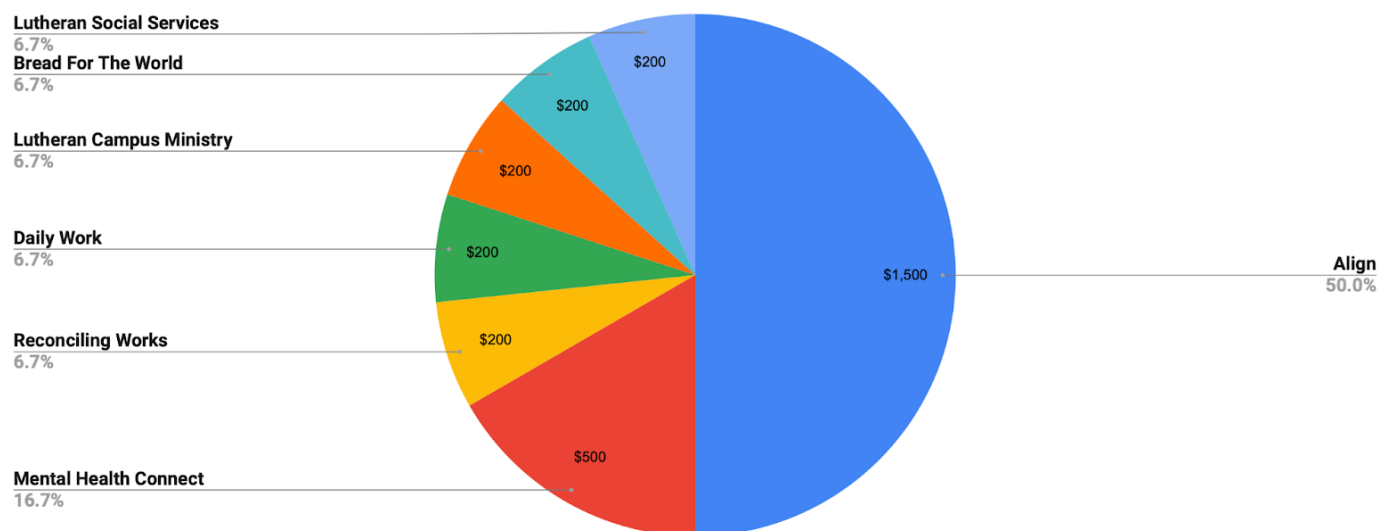
Aligning a Budget to our Beliefs

Outreach Table has two ways we allocate money to support the work in our community; a \$3000 line item in the overall church budget is a collective contribution on behalf of OSLC, and Ministries of the Month is an individual way to contribute.

In 2023 Ministries of the Month collected between \$630 and \$2200 for each organization; more than Outreach allocated in our budget for most organizations. Therefore, the Outreach Table decided to shift some organizations we supported in the past to Ministries of the Month, and to add new organizations to our collective support. *Note: to see a full list of the Ministries of the Month and the contributions for 2023, see the slide deck.*

The pie graph shows how the \$3000 in the Outreach Budget will be allocated in 2024. The largest allocations to Align Minneapolis and Mental Health Connect signal new opportunities.

- Align Minneapolis (<https://www.alignmpls.org/>) combines direct service for our unhoused neighbors with efforts to build power in ways that shift our public policies. Unhoused neighbors have a seat at these tables and are learning to organize so their experiences are centered.
- Mental Health Connect (<https://www.mhconnect.org/>) is a collaborative of faith communities working together to help destigmatize mental illness to make sure all people can find the free, customized, and confidential help they need.



Aligning our Action to our Beliefs

How will the Outreach Team operate with no meetings?! We will be going out into the community on field trips to visit other faith communities, to learn about the work of community organizations, or to public meetings about our neighborhood. These experiences will be led by Pastor Esther and the Outreach team, but will be open to all members. The idea is that intergenerational fellowship of our own members will create joy and meaning above and beyond evangelism and outreach. Some field trips will be perfect for young families. Others will be perfect for the youth group or for the elders. NOTE: On slide 10 there is a ten-point plan detailing how this could work. During the forum members started parts they loved, added notes to what they questioned or wanted to change, and crossed off parts that don't seem right for our congregation yet.
