As I write this article, it is 50 degrees on January 31 in Minneapolis. I receive the day as a gift from our Creator God, and yet the temperature is a stark reminder of the climate crisis and all of the ways that our world is out of whack. Even though the sun is shining, I feel clouds of worry gathering in my heart.

Daily, we are aware that our world and our lives are in need of healing. Our own bodies and souls cry out for healing and hope from personal and collective crises. Our neighbors in Camp Nenookaasi were again evicted yesterday, and we know there is more work to be done to find pathways for healing, stability, and community for our neighbors living outside and living with substance use disorders. As we look at our broader world and see the wounds of war and violence still being inflicted, peace and reconciliation feel far off.

On February 14, we enter the season of Lent as we gather for Ash Wednesday worship at 6:30pm. We tell the truth about our need for healing and redirection, and we turn to the God who offers us healing for our bodies and souls. Our Lent theme this year is drawn from Ray Makeever's beautiful song, "Jesus, Healing Power, is here among us." We will confess and embody this truth together as we come to the well of divine love and mercy at the baptismal font, as we listen for the Spirit's wisdom that comes to us with both comfort and challenge through the ancient stories of our faith, and as we share in our holy meal where Jesus is present to fill us with the vitality of his spirit - abundant life. Through these ordinary things, we become the body of Christ together – we bear one another's burdens, weep together, rejoice together, and are sent out together to follow in Christ's way of humble service and radical love.

Jesus, Healing Power, will be flowing among us during Lent in many different ways, including:

- Ash Wednesday and Holy Week services
- Contemplative Prayer on Wednesday nights, with a prayer labyrinth in the sanctuary
- Community meals on Wednesday nights, where we will also engage in faith practices and Living Questions together around the table
- An anointing and healing prayer station at the font on Sunday mornings
- An adult forum focus on repentance and forgiveness
- And in all the other, ordinary ways we are the body of Christ to one another and the world

May the Healing Power of Jesus flow among us freely in this season, bringing release and hope, and renewing our strength and good courage. Amen.

Mission of the Month: Calvary Food Shelf Gayle Lamb

Feeding our neighbors is an act of faith and compassion. Please remember all those that are hungry and in need of nourishment. The following article is our witness to feeding and supporting our community. As stated below donations of dollars go furthest in supporting this mission, but donations of food stuffs are also needed. Put donations in collection box in narthex.

Calvary Food Shelf is the Mission of the Month for February at Our Saviour's. The food shelf has been in transition over the last 16 months. Calvary Lutheran Church buildings were sold to Trellis a developer chosen by the congregation. The church and parking lot were converted to 41 apartment units. The food shelf had operated in the basement of the church. So during construction the food shelf worked out of a temporary space next to Jakeenos Pizza at 36th and Chicago Avenue. To give proper service to the customers, appointments had to be scheduled. There were 8-9 families scheduled every 15 min twice a week. Serving between 50-80 families per each distribution day.

Now we are currently back in the church location at 39th and Chicago Avenue. The space is very functional and allows the food shelf to continue serving the people of the neighborhood. Plus the residents of the new Belfry apartments. A majority of which are low income. To better serve the customers in a respectful

atmosphere, appointments are now scheduled 5-6 families or individuals every 15 min.

Calvary Food Shelf currently has 3800 families that are using the food shelf with 80 families on the waiting list. The customers can only come once per month. Distribution days are Wednesdays and Saturdays. Food deliveries are made on Tuesdays to shut-ins.

Supplying the food shelf is a challenge. Melissa Brooks the coordinator and logistics master has the task of sourcing food to meet the dietary and cultural needs of the customers. Food is purchased from Second Harvest, Food Group and stores such as Costco. Besides purchasing food at discount pricing Melissa does have access to random free items.

The food shelf is unique in that fresh fruit, vegetables, proteins and dairy are offered. Eggs, milk, oil, spices, salt are always needed

The following items are purchased with donor dollars:

- 36# of chicken breasts \$36 for 10 families
- 15 dozen eggs for \$33 (when she is not able to them for free)
- A case of 12x24oz vegetable oil \$22
- A12 pack of garlic powder for under \$10

The wishlist is:

- Financial donations
- Cooking oil 24oz
- White flour & Maizal/Maseca masa
- Garlic powder & Cumin
- Canned fruit
- Non-dairy milk (soy, oat, almond)
- Peanut butter

If anyone has a Costco account bulk purchase of toilet paper is a good donation item. Feminine products are also a needed item.

The food shelf is primarily run by volunteers and there are opportunities for all ages to participate.

With heavy sadness, Nenookaasi Healing Camp was evicted the morning on January 30th with no transition to temporary/permanent housing! The residents only had 90 minutes to evacuate with no notification from the city! Allyson Green and I were able to be there to accompany the residents by helping moving things out of the area, tore down yurts and tarps. We were there with many people who care for the residents. At this point, the relatives (residents) are now moved to 2213 16th Ave S. Minneapolis, MN 55404.

I thank you to those who have helped out for the last three months especially our Sunday school children for putting together wonderful kits, supply drives, and for some of us who brought items in abundance or helped the residents in quick response and prayed with them! We were with them as our neighbors and we continue to pray for their lives and safety. We continue to be present wit the relatives of the encampment and to advocate for housing in Minneapolis through ISAIAH, Align Minneapolis, and other community organizing groups.

Property reimagining updates – things are moving along Pastor Martha

Over the 5 weeks of January, we had a marvelous crew of members show up weekly for a property development study group. We began our work with a devotion using Genesis 1. Where is the creative activity

of God already at work among us, present here and in relationships with our neighbors? How can our property project magnify that? These are questions we can return to as we prayerfully continue in this work.

Over the 5 weeks, we highlighted our key objectives and needs for the project, surfaced some strategic alternatives, and listed out some evaluation criteria. We had small groups research various sub-topics to help us go deeper and learn from other projects. These sub-groups have focused on housing (rental and home ownership possibilities), climate innovation/design, landback and reparatory development, 'think outside the box' group, and church building/LVC's future group.

Five weeks is a rich time, and as we have made progress, we also know we have more work to do to get ready for a retreat with OSCS on March 2. At that retreat, a small group from OSLC church council, OSCS board, and the joint property committee – about 15-20 folks in total – will come together and hope to coalesce around a common vision for the campus. We are welcoming Sara Joy Proppe of The Proximity Project, a development consultant, to help facilitate the retreat. She comes to us highly recommended from Calvary Lutheran Church down the street, as she worked with them to steward along their property project. She also worked with us at our last property development study group meeting.

Members of the joint property committee are also laying more groundwork for future work ahead, including continuing conversations with Normandale Housing (who own a house on Chicago in the middle of the campus), pursuing capital campaign bids so we are ready to have partners to work with when we're ready to begin that phase of this project, engaging in a free design event with volunteer architects to workshop some possibilities, and continuing to show up in the neighborhood. We are mindful that as we keep going, we need to loop back to neighbors, as community engagement isn't a 'one and done' thing, but a relational process.

I hope many of you can join us on February 4 for the forum. If you can't make it, or have other ideas and insights you'd like to share, please don't hesitate to reach out to me or members of the joint property committee, which includes me, David Scheie, Rico Morales, Tal Anderson, and Renate Willer along with OSCS representation.

Getting ready for this transition with grace, grief and gratitude Pastor Martha

Praise God for Mary Preus and all the ways she has kept our worship vibrant and joyful, faithful and fresh! Over these 9 months we will relish singing together with Mary. If you've been waiting to join the choir – now's your time!

We will also be getting ready for this transition in these ways:

- Formation of a Celebration and Farewell committee (aka, the Party People): This group will plan celebrations (ie, a choir concert) and other ways of saying a loving and heartfelt goodbye after Mary's amazing 30 years of leadership among us.
- Formation of a Worship and Music task force (looking for clever nickname): This group will work with Pastor Martha to review Mary's duties, articulate our values for the future of music and worship, do an assessment of our music and worship needs, aid in discernment about welcoming an interim in October, and write a new job description as we get ready for a new permanent position.

We need time to grieve and space to imagine where God is calling us next. If you have ideas for someone who might be a good fit for us as an interim musician, please reach out to me.

As Mary said – God is at work and alive among us! We will continue to praise God with a new song in this season of transition. And we will be gentle with ourselves in our grief, share loving goodbyes, celebrate, and give all praise to God our Maker.

Resolution regarding killing of civilians Amy Blumenshine

Sometimes the heart feels too heavy to share. As I write, the US backed Israeli military is bombing, starving, terrorizing, and sickening over 2 million people—inflicting suffering and killing mostly unarmed civilians, mostly children. In addition, the US backed Israeli government has stopped water, electricity, communications, and medical care for these bombarded, 2 million of whom have had to flee their homes.

I realize that there are very different news sources but the only justifications I've heard is that Hamas is really bad. I do not support Hamas, but I do know that there are better ways of addressing the Oct 7 attack. It's obvious— if mostly unstated— that the US erred massively in how we responded to the 9/11 attack. As Christians and as members of humanity, we seek to not respond to evil with evil. Unfortunately, the US and Israel stand in opposition to a world that demands a ceasefire.

That fire hurts us all. We are fueling the fire with funds that have been stolen from our own dire domestic needs. Indeed, people are suffering and dying in this country due to their preventable poverty.

The fire is likely to spread. Already our troops have suffered harm. Numerous other sparks are evident both in the region and in our own country, with some feeling license to engage in religiously prejudicial actions.

The fire creates a beacon for other tyrants to impose their military might, seeing that humanity will not stop them.

The fire also creates embers that will light more fires in the future as some of the traumatized survivors will project their pain onto others, including those they love.

The fire itself is toxic; we all share the atmosphere and climate emergency. Every flight, every bomb, every destruction of concrete, every tank fueled by gas spurs not just toxic residue but climate poison — in our rapidly diminishing window of opportunity to avert climate catastrophe.

I listened to the South African attorneys as they made their case before the International Court of Justice that Israel was committing genocide. I found them convincing. (I also note the raised bar for sermons: they quoted the Bethlehem Lutheran pastor's Christmas sermon!)

To be clear, traumatized people deserve sympathy and recovery options, but nothing justifies repeating horror on others. Never again means never again to any group. All of our humanity is diminished if we fail to stop this fire. Friends don't let friends commit mass murder. Prevent moral injury! Prevent suffering and death!
