Welcome

We are happy that you have joined us around the word, the font, and the table in the worship of these days. All people are welcome here!

Our Saviour's Lutheran Church, a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has been firmly planted in the Phillips Community since 1912. A Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation, we celebrate our diversity of age, race, gender identities, sexual orientations, culture, and citizenship.

The Three Days

Every Sunday in worship the church celebrates the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit gathers us to receive again the gifts of God that come to us through Christ, the saving Word. On several key days at the center of the church year, however, worship takes a particular shape. These central days have come to be known as the Three Days, recalling Jesus' own words to his disciples that he would be handed over to death, and that "after three days he will rise again" (Mark 10:34). The Three Days encompass the time from Maundy Thursday evening through the eve of Easter Day. In particular, the services of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Vigil of Easter unfold in a single movement, as the church each year makes the passage with Christ through death into life.

Maundy Thursday March 28, 2024

With nightfall and the beginning of this liturgy, our Lenten observance comes to its culmination. We gather with Christians around the world in observing the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Our remembering is more than a retracing of the last days of Jesus' life. Rather, throughout these Three Days, through word, sacrament, and ritual, we participate in the saving power of Jesus' passover from death to life.

The biblical gospels narrate two events on the Thursday before Jesus' death: his last extraordinary meal with his followers and his symbolic gesture of washing their feet. During worship we are invited to participate in both expressions of faithfulness. We begin on Maundy Thursday by acknowledging our sin and receiving forgiveness. Being forgiven by God turns us toward reconciliation with and service to our neighbor, symbolized by hand and footwashing. Our baptism strengthens us to live out the command—the root of the word Maundy—to love one another.







Word

First Reading Exodus 13:3, 6-10

Moses said to the people,

"Remember this day on which you came out of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, because YAHWEH brought you out from there by strength of hand; no leavened bread shall be eaten.

Seven days you shall eat unleavened bread, and on the seventh day there shall be a festival to YAHWEH. Unleavened bread shall be eaten for seven days; no leavened bread shall be seen in your possession, and no leaven shall be seen among you in all your territory. You shall tell your child on that day, 'It is because of what God did for me when I came out of Egypt.' It shall serve for you as a sign on your hand and as a reminder on your forehead, so that the teaching of God may be on your lips; for with a strong hand YAHWEH brought you out of Egypt. You shall keep this ordinance at its proper time from year to year.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.**

When Jewish neighbors gather for Passover, they recall the mighty acts of liberation narrated in Exodus. We revisit that story to honor its central place in Jesus' own ministry of redemption, and to remember that we gather over these Three Days because of what God has done for us. We respond to the story of the Exodus with our thanksgiving. In the words of the psalm, we join the ancient Israelites by lifting the cup of salvation, for we too have been freed from our bonds. Psalm 116:1-4, 12-19 Piano side reads non-bold verses; Window side bold verses

I love you God, you hear my cry, because you listened closely on the day I called to you. Death itself surrounded me, and trapped me in its tomb called anguish and despair. So I called out to you in anguish "Save me, God" I cried, "O Save me" So how can I repay you, God, for all the goodness you have shown? I will take this cup called "restoration," and raise it in celebration. With all the vows that I have made to you I will fulfill them before these many witnesses. And death itself I'll offer up to you, as greatest gift, a precious thing. And I shall ever be your faithful, willing servant, for you have broken every bond on my behalf and set me free. So I lift this sacrifice of gratitude for freedom's sake, and in your name I offer it with all my vows. Among these people, at the center of your city,

before the doors of your own house, I speak my deepest praise to you, forever.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.**

Paul describes Jesus' last supper and hands on to others the tradition that sharing in the bread and cup of this meal proclaims the death of the Lord.

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Gospel John 13:1-17, 31b-35 Spark Story Bible page 462

The holy gospel according to John, the 13th chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to Abba God. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that Abba God had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. John's gospel usually heightens and deepens the meaning of the narratives about Jesus, and it is only in this gospel that we find the story of Jesus washing the disciples feet. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For Jesus knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, Jesus said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord — and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.


"Now the Son-of-Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in God's own self and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Judeans so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

This is the good news. **Praise to you, O Christ.**







Footwashing or Handwashing


Distribution



We may ponder the church's sorrow over Christ's death, or the paring down of the self in order to receive the life of Christ, or the final stripping away of our own life before death.


The liturgy does not end here but merely pauses, continuing tomorrow evening with Good Friday.

We follow the paschal candle into the sanctuary. The light of Christ. **Thanks be to God.** Jesus is not about the past, and the Three Days are not about recalling events of 2,000 years ago. The date inscribed on the candle is not, for example, 33, but this year's date. Christ is today, his resurrection now.




Easter Proclamation

Profession of Faith

The presiding minister addresses the assembly. The assembly may join in the responses.

I ask you to profess your faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church.

Gathered around the fire, we were greeted in the name of the triune God. Here we gather around the font, once again standing in the power of the name of God, who is the source of all life, the word of salvation, the spirit of mercy. We receive that name, enter that name, are saved by that name. Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God? **I renounce them.**

Do you renounce the powers of this world that rebel against God? **I renounce them.**

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

I renounce them.

Do you believe in God the Father? I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit? I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.
