

She has a passion for social justice, racial reparations, healing and storytelling that has been felt across the globe. She is the very first Native Woman Theologian with a PhD. in the ELCA. Her work primarily focuses on systemic theology, with a unique approach to Lakota Spirituality and how it can inform Christianity and instill healing. She is currently serves at All Nations Indian church and an adjunct faculty at Augsburg University and St. Olaf College.

May 12: Kenna and Khonni !Khabeb will be doing the children's message, and Clara Owens will preach. They are youth members at OSLC.

We will have a youth-led service! Kenna and Khonni will lead the children's message and Clara will be our preacher! We look forward to hearing God's message from these three fearless youth.

Are you willing to volunteer for San Pablo/St Paul Lutheran Church children's summer camp? Pastor Esther

Pastor Hierald Osorto reached out to ask for our help to cover some of the costs for this year's children's summer camp. Due to most of the congregations being undocumented, newly arrived in the country, and having no access to jobs or regular income, the church has a very limited budget. This year's summer camp will explore the question, "What is God like?" Drawing inspiration from Rachel Held Evans' and Matthew Paul Turner's bestselling book (aptly named What Is God Like?), they will reflect on God in Creation, Community, and our family and friends through group activities with community leaders and neighborhood partners.

The camp will run from 9 AM to 2:30 PM, June 17 to June 21, 2024, for kids ages 5-12. Activities include visits to the Bell Museum Planetarium, the Family Partnership Free Little Library, and the Heart of the Beast. They will also partner with a local artist to facilitate a weeklong activity with our participants. This is a bilingual summer camp and their goal is to host 15-20 children from the neighborhood. They are looking for volunteers to serve snacks and to accompany children to some of the places that they will be visiting. It's okay if you do not speak Spanish.



Their family includes Micaela (18), who will be attending the Seattle University in the fall, Paysen (5), who loves Harry Potter Clue and playing with his cousins, as well as their dogs Parker and Bella, who love to walk along the Mississippi River.

Taking Stock of Church Peace-Making Amy Blumenshine

The annual Minneapolis Area Synod (MAS) Assembly is likely taking place as you read this. The main action is expected to be the election of the next bishop; Bishop Anne Svennungsen has completed her two term limit. No OSLC resolution will be addressed at the Assembly as both of those we passed were disqualified. There are other terms I could use, but I will think of this as a year of pruning. Our peace-making initiatives were pruned this year; may they flourish even better in the future!

At this time when local church moral clarity on war-making is paused, let us reflect on what has transpired since our 2023 Resolution was passed at synod assembly. The resolution was intended to encourage examining the case for making war in Ukraine in the aftermath of the Russian invasion and claim of territory. Unfortunately much death, maiming, destruction, poisoning and greenhouse gases and other waste of resources were executed with no apparent benefit to anyone except the war profiteers. The Ukraine war was a stalemate awaiting negotiations a year ago and it remains the same today.

My heart hurts for Ukraine. Whether fired from the Russian or Ukrainian sides, the bombs drop on land that was considered Ukraine before 2014. The families, homes, and livelihoods destroyed are Ukrainian. It is estimated that half a million combatants, many of them from both sides conscripted, have been killed.*

Several "almost" detonations of nuclear materials have been reported, and more nuclear weapons are now threatening.

A Congressional debate with mixed agenda did occur this spring before sending more billions of dollars of weapons to Ukraine. (By the way, these expenditures will be paid by future tax payers as they were added to the national debt.) Our synod resolution asked for "transparent hearings with a wide range of experts, including those who are voices of peace, consider alternatives to violence, and are not affiliated with the arms industry," but that did not occur!

I do pray that some Christians could be heard arguing that trying to resolve conflict by relying on killing and destroying instead of diplomacy is immoral as well as futile. Obviously, we do not expect our resolution or our Bishop to end a war, but we do believe it is our Christian obligation to try. Part of our role in society is to help establish a societal moral compass.

The Bishop's annual report includes how our resolution as amended was implemented: "This resolution called on the Bishop of the Minneapolis Area Synod to reiterate to the appropriate federal elected officials about their responsibility as leaders regarding engagement with the war in Ukraine. After significant discussion, the resolution passed in a close vote. The Bishop wrote a letter to five Members of Congress and both U.S. Senators from Minnesota expressing the sense of the Assembly."

Not mentioned were these further actions amended to the OSLC resolution, that the Assembly:

- expresses sympathy and support for victims of this conflict, and urges its congregations to help the victims of war who may appear on their doorstep;
- declares this war to be unjust and commends all governments involved to seek a negotiated settlement to this conflict; and
- urges congregations and members of the synod to prayerfully consider and discuss how Christ's call to be peacemakers can lead us to be a voice for peace regarding the Ukrainian-Russian conflict.

I am among those Lutherans who maintain that even as we <u>pray</u> for peace each Sunday—while we <u>pay</u> more and more for war—at least our Church should clearly <u>say</u>: Stop the killing; there is a better <u>way</u>.

*The contrast of civilian to military deaths in the Ukraine compared to Gaza conflicts is stark. It was estimated that the Israelis killed more civilians in Gaza in the first three weeks since their response began from the Hamas attack on October 7th than civilians who have been killed in the (then) two years of the Ukraine war.
