

# **Mission of the Month: Hope House**

Casa Esperanza – "Hope House" – is a ministry of the Salvadoran Lutheran Church, providing basic care to the unsheltered of San Salvador. For over 25 years this Ministry of Love & Solidarity has been a welcoming place for men, women, and families to socialize, share a hot meal, wash themselves and their clothing, receive basic first aid, and participate in substance abuse recovery.

Current funding of \$1500/month enables Pastora Emely Chavez and her volunteers to provide meals and community to 30-50 street folks four days per week. Life on the street in San Salvador is precarious. Some sleep outside. Others – including some of the students in the Seeds of Hope school sponsorship program -- couch hop.

Many of the men who drop in at Hope House are deportees, returned to their country of origin when they were picked up by immigration officials in the United States. Some don't even speak Spanish -- even though they were born in El Salvador. Most don't have any family who might help them get on their feet.

Our Saviour's Lutheran Church has long served the unhoused via Our Saviour's Housing. Hope House's current search for stable funding gives the OSLC community the opportunity to extend similar care to some of the most vulnerable on the streets of El Salvador's capital.

Hope House has been added to Outreach Table's Mission of the Month for August. Please consider giving to help Hope House secure their funding – and assure many of the unhoused in El Salvador's capital city the care Jesus asks Christians to provide to our neighbors in need.

# Praying in the Spirit: Nurturing Children in Three Communities, One Neighborhood — UPDATES!

Our Program Team - We now have a full program team at Our Saviour's! We're thrilled to welcome Kent Goodroad and Alyssa Schwitzer, who bring incredible energy, enthusiasm, and deep love for children, youth, and families to be part of the grant. On July 21, Sarah, Kent, Alyssa, and I met for the first time as a team. We reflected on how we will care for one another, collaborate intentionally, shape our vision for the grant, and honor our partnerships with churches that may differ from us. We're excited to stay connected with our cohort team and leaders across all three congregations and will help build agendas and guided activities for the cohort gatherings.

6/29 – Pre-Assessment Meeting with Raj and the OSLC Cohort Team - In our conversation with Raj, we reflected on key values in faith formation with children, including the power of music, active participation in worship, and cultivating a culture of radical welcome. Children are deeply engaged through communion, storytelling, seasonal rituals, and service projects like care bags for unhoused neighbors. We also discussed the importance of creating inclusive environments for neurodivergent children and adults. Looking ahead, shared activities among OSLC, All Nations, and San Pablo—such as bilingual worship, sacred site visits, and Las Posadas—will foster connection and hospitality beyond each congregation. More updates will follow the October 4 cohort retreat, where Raj will share final findings and recommendations from all three churches.

# OSLC Summer Read: Healing Resistance: A Radically Different Response to Harm by Kazu Haga

At the end of our Kingian Nonviolence training in May, we decided to offer a book study to participants – and we're extending the invitation to everyone at OSLC!

This powerful book is written by Kazu Haga, a Kingian Nonviolence practitioner who was trained like your pastors with Dr. Bernard Lafayette, Jr. back in 2009. He has taken the training into prisons and many other contexts, and he is a founder of the East Point Peace Academy in Oakland, CA (the nonviolent foil to West Point). This book walks through a lot of the Kingian Nonviolence training – including the principles and steps that

are drawn directly from Dr. King's writings and life. The book is full of great stories and reflections on what it means to commit to nonviolence as a way of life.

Things keep moving forward with our property. If you feel a little lost with it, check out our blog for past updates here: https://oslcproperty.weebly.com/. Your prayers are ALWAYS welcome – please do add this entire project to your regular prayers, that the Spirit might continue to lead and guide us.

Here are a few updates on our property work:

New Roof – coming August 25ish - As approved by Church council, we are moving forward with getting a new roof. The construction process will likely begin the week of August 25. We'll keep the congregation updated on if there are disruptions to the building while the roof is going up; we anticipate disruptions to be minimal, likely related to alley parking.

Solar is coming, too - We had a great congregational meeting on July 20 to vote on a couple of matters, including a lease for the roof that allows Solar By Us to operate a solar array on our roof. Our vision of having solar is coming true after years of work and prayer. Hallelujah! The solar will be installed after the roof install, this fall.

Doors – Jim Johnson is faithfully working on getting door closers for our sanctuary and hospitality center doors to stop the slamming and the floating open issues we're having.

Capital Campaign Feasibility Study continues – Our feasibility study team (me, Mike Huffman, Mike Troutman, Jim Unglaube, Javen Swanson, Robin Stramp, David Scheie, Nick Smith) are conducting feasibility study conversations about our upcoming capital campaign – with congregation members, OSCS donors, community influencers, foundations, and others. At the end of August and September, we will integrate our

findings and continue to prepare for a capital campaign.

Indigenous Protector Movement – Great Cookout, MOU about to be signed – We had a wonderful cookout with IPM leaders, OSCS staff, and OSLC members at the end of June. It was precious relationship-building time, and we hope to do similar events in the future. By the end of August, we will have signed the MOU that OSLC Council, OSCS Board, and IPM Board have worked on and approved so that we are on a clear shared path for a land transfer to IPM for October 2026. We hope to have more celebration around the signing of the legal agreement that will follow the MOU.

OSCS and VOA submitted MHFA application July 10 – OSCS and Volunteers of America, who would be co-developers of a future 6-story building on Chicago Ave, submitted an application to Minnesota Housing (MHFA) to fund the permanent supportive housing component of the building. We learn in mid-December if OSCS and VOA receive an award.

Celebrating the Shelter Re-opening! - What a fantastic shelter re-opening celebration on July 17! It was great to see many of you there. The new shelter is beautiful, with dignified private spaces for residents and wonderful office space for staff. The shelter can now accommodate 38 individuals, up from 21 previously.

# **OSLC Budget Update**

Half-way through the calendar year, it's a great time for an update on the congregational budget.

Currently, we are running a slight deficit for the year so far. Overall expenses are running 4% lower than budgeted, but are higher in some areas – including some property-related items.

On the revenue side, pledged offerings are running about 10% lower than budgeted, which is about the same percentage we are running behind 2024. Overall, revenue is about 5% lower than budgeted.

With expenses expected to increase in the second half of the year, households are encouraged to examine their own pledges for the rest of the year so that we can end the year with a balanced budget.

It's an exciting time at Our Saviour's with the property project and other initiatives moving forward – and strong support from members and friends of the congregation allows this work to happen.

## **Friendship After Devastation**

Friendship After Devastation is the apt title of an upcoming event celebrating the St. Paul/Nagasaki Sister City relationship. In these unprecedented political times, I continue to hope for the break from convention that would lead to the US joining the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW). As the first country to use atomic weapons, it's appropriate for us to be the first atomic power to sign up for the ratification process. (By the way, the US has long been party to a treaty that commits us -along with other atomic powers- to eliminating the weapons. The TPNW, however, includes action steps and a verifiable process, and already has the force of law in many countries.)

The St. Paul/Nagasaki Sister City group will again be commemorating the 1945 atomic bombings the first week of August. This is also the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its founding and there are several other special activities.

The Kids' Guernica Project brings a physical piece of art begun by children in Nagasaki to be completed by American youth. Two free public workshops, both 4 - 8 pm, invite children's participation. Monday, August 4, features a talk about peace while also drafting the design on paper. Wednesday, August 6, will be the painting day. Pizza will be provided both nights at the Cha Ami Japanese Cultural Center, 2855 Anthony Lane South, Suite B5, St. Anthony, MN. Register to participate at spnscc@gmail.com

The completed mural begins its showings at the Nagasaki bombing commemoration, Friday August 8, at the Como Park Peace labyrinth (across from the Pavilion), continues to many of the other August events listed below, and then returns to Nagasaki where it will be on display.

The original Guernica artwork by Pablo Picasso portrayed the horror of the aerial bombing of Guernica, Spain in 1937. As history's first aerial saturation bombing, its indiscriminate massacre of humans and animals was considered incredibly deviant, callous, and cruel. Picasso decried the "military caste" in his country who had caused this "ocean of pain and death." How could humans do this to others?!

Nelson Rockefeller later commissioned a tapestry copy of Picasso's painting which was displayed prominently at the UN to prevent war. That tapestry was, however, infamously covered up during the US press conferences promoting the war against Iraq. All of that should prompt our reckoning with the moral slide of our developed countries – how we've descended from decrying the pain and horror of such abuse of power to amplifying it thoughtlessly. Costa Rica stands as an exception, of course, in having eliminated their military in 1948.

The current US "modernization" of our nuclear weapons is spurring a worldwide nuclear arms race. Not only is the US shifting massive public treasure to the effort, but simultaneously threatening other countries, including neighbors and long-term allies. How will future generations judge these accelerations toward both nuclear and climate catastrophe?

Yet in the midst of this insanity, we remember our commitment to neighbor love and work for peace. The following events are additional opportunities to join with other kindred spirits in reinforcing our shared humanity.
