

# Visions of the Reign of God The Prophet Isaiah, Potluck, Wopila Gathering, what else? Pastor Martha

Our theme for Advent is "Visions of the Reign of God." This season we will dwell in ancient visions of shalom from the prophet Isaiah, and we will invite one another to share our dreams and visions, too. What does a world healed and made whole by our loving God look like, smell like, sound like, feel like, taste like? Where do you catch a glimpse of the reign of God here and now?

Dwelling with and sharing our visions of the reign of God is holy work – and essential for our souls. If we can't imagine the world we long for, we will let others define the world for us and constrict our hopes, our loves, our possibilities, our lives. We read in our Scripture, "without vision, people perish" (Proverbs 29:18). We also read in our Scripture that the Spirit has been poured out on all flesh – and young and old have been blessed with visions and dreams (Acts 2). I lament that too often, we do not dare to share our visions with one another.

I want to share two visions I have had lately of God's reign. The first was on Sunday. Our Somali neighbors who have been targeted with hate invited us to join them for a potluck at Karmel Mall. And it was glorious! There were tears of fear and gratitude, lots of laughter, and a feast of sambusas, Norwegian waffles and so much more. As we shared life together, I could picture the mountaintop the prophet Isaiah spoke of. All peoples from all nations would gather together in peace for one great potluck – and oppression and death would be no more.

The other vision is anticipatory. Tomorrow I will attend the Wopila Gathering at All Nations with Pastor Esther and 10 other OSLC members. We will have 2 friendship tables and join with other congregations in a spirit of gratitude, mutuality, care, and celebration. As I picture us feasting together across culture around tables of friendship, I glimpse again a vision of the reign of God. In another article, please read Dr. Kelly Sherman Conroy's theological reflection on living reciprocity. What visions do her reflections stir up in you?

This Advent, we remember how an angel appeared in a vision to Mary and told her that she was to bear a son who would be the Savior of the world. As a Jewish peasant, she was part of an oppressed minority; she was a woman in a very patriarchal culture. And yet she did not allow the Roman empire or religious establishment to constrain her hope and imagination. She said a bold and courageous YES to the Spirit's work in her. Thanks be to God.

Come, Jesus, come – into our world, into our homes, into our hearts, and yes, into our imaginations. Grant us visions of the reign of God, and unleash our hope! Amen.

## **Theological Reflection: Living Reciprocity**

This is an excerpt from Kelly Sherman-Conroy's study guide of Robin Wall-Kimmerer's book The Serviceberry. If you'd like a copy of the whole study guide, please ask one of the pastors and we will email it to you or print it as you desire.

The Sioux tradition of the Giveaway (Wopila) calls on a person who has been blessed, say, at a wedding, naming, or graduation to give gifts to the community, thereby sharing their joy and good fortune. Honor is found not in how much you accumulate, but how much you give away.

This is profoundly countercultural in Western society, but it is second nature to our Native elders and, indeed, it was practiced by the early Christians empowered by the Holy Spirit. Our former pastor, Rev. Marlene Whiterabbit Helgemo (Ho-Chunk Nation), often reminded people: "Being a Christian means being a good relative." She meant that Jesus calls us to love one another as kin, mitákuye oyás'iK, all are relatives and therefore to care for one another's needs. Rev. Helgemo herself was a trailblazer: the first Native American woman ordained in the Lutheran Church, and she served All Nations for 30 years. She led by example in sharing resources. Under her guidance, if someone was struggling to pay rent or put food on the table, the church community quietly pooled funds to help. She partnered with organizations on Franklin Avenue to distribute food and clothing.

This reciprocal care extended beyond our immediate circle; for instance, during the Standing Rock pipeline protests in 2016, All Nations gathered supplies and sent members (including Rev. Helgemo) to support the Water Protectors, standing in solidarity as relatives. To us, reciprocity is lived out in these acts responding to the gifts we have (money, time, voice) by showing up for others and for Mother Earth.

In the Christian tradition, we see reciprocity in Jesus's actions. He fed the hungry, healed the sick, and ultimately gave himself for the life of the world. Jesus taught, "Freely you have received; freely give" (Matthew 10:8). There's a harmony between that gospel mandate and our Native values of generosity.

Both confront the spirit of selfishness what Kimmerer calls the "Windigo" mindset of taking too much. In Ojibwe stories, the Windigo is never satisfied, always consuming without giving back.

Kimmerer warns that modern capitalism can turn us all into Windigos if we're not careful. But our faith and heritage equip us to resist that. We do it by fostering mutual aid and remembering that real wealth is having enough to share.

## Lilly Grant Update: Sensory Prayer Experiences for Advent and Beyond!

This past November the OSLC Lilly Grant Cohort has introduced youth ages 0-12 with multisensory opportunities to engage with prayer. Preschool and kindergarten youth made Prayer Snack Mix during the Sunday school hour. Each item in the snack mix was connected to a part of the world or their life for which they might pray. We heard children munching on crackers while offering up prayers of healing for their dance teacher's cold and remembering a pet who had passed while tasting an M&M.

Youth of all ages are bringing prayer into their bodies and voices on Wednesday evenings during Children's Choir with Kent and Alyssa. They joyfully share these songs of prayer with the OSLC community during Sunday worship. These rhythms and songs are a part of them now, and several families have mentioned noticing their children singing these melodies at home while coloring or doing a puzzle.

This past Sunday during the Reign of Christ, the Lilly Cohort hosted At-Home-Prayer-Wall-Kit making before and after worship. Families filled paper bags with twinkle lights, mini clothespins, and slips of blue paper. A guide offers ideas for families to build at-home rituals around prayer, encouraging families to launch these moments of connection at the start of the Advent season. We'd love for families to take pictures and short videos of their family's prayer wall and submit them to Kent Goodroad. He'll compile and share them as a way to be witnessed to, supportive of, and inspired by one another's prayer journeys. Missed last Sunday's Prayer-Wall-Kit assembly? There will be premade kits available in the Narthex this coming Sunday (look for the blue bags with handles). Please take one for your home!

On Saturday December 6th, all cohort leaders from our three congregations, along with pastors and staff, will gather for our first cohort retreat! We will focus on building relationships with one another as partners, reflecting on this year's programs, mapping out the gifts and resources within our churches and neighborhoods, and breaking bread together. We are truly looking forward to this retreat and the conversations it will spark.

We also invite all families with small and young children to join us for our Shared Event, hosted by San Pablo—St. Paul Lutheran Church, on December 19th at 6:30 PM for **Las Posadas**. This is a short neighborhood

procession filled with hope and peace as we sing traditional songs in Spanish and English. Afterward, enjoy traditional food, a piñata, and tentatively, live music.

Use the QR Code for the <u>sign-up sheet</u> if you would like to register with your family. Please note that **there is no childcare**, so parents and caregivers must always stay with their children.

If you register for Las Posadas, you are **required** to attend the Adult Forum on **Sunday, December 14th**, which will focus on cultural competency and somatic work. We have invited Rachel Svanoe Moynihan, a somatic coach and does anti-racism work, to help prepare us as we enter a different space with different cultures and languages.

We also encourage you to return for the Adult Forum on **Sunday, December 21st**, where we will reflect together on your experience at Las Posadas and the feelings and insights that arose for you. This forum will be facilitated by Allyson Green.

## **Reparations Report**

## Reparations Team

This congregation has been on a committed journey of reparations for several years. To live out that goal we follow five interconnected commitments: spiritual practice, political solidarity, grief and truth telling, building relationships, and wealth distribution. As part of those commitments, we have included an item dedicated to reparations in the church budget for the past four years. Due to the generosity of the Our Saviour's community, the 2025 budget for reparations is \$18,000, double the amount we began with the first year.

At the recent meeting of the reparations team we rooted ourselves in this quote from *The Serviceberry* as we decided how to re-gift this abundance: "In a gift economy, wealth is understood as having enough to share. The practice to deal with abundance is to give it away. The currency in the gift economy is relationship which is expressed as gratitude, interdependence and the on-going cycle of reciprocity. In a gift economy we nurture the bonds of community mutual well-being."

The reparations team is heartened by how the congregation has embraced economic repair and environmental stewardship into its broader ministry. Relationships begun in recent years with the Indigenous Protectors Movement, the Minnesota Immigrant Movement, City of Lakes Land Community Trust and Unidos have blossomed in the property reimaging project underway with OSCS. Core components of the vision include land back, wealth building opportunities for BIPOC families and environmental justice for this neighborhood.

As you review how we discerned to allocate this year's reparations commitment, you will see both continuity with past allocations and some new frontiers. Along with many others, we're disappointed with the obstacles that EPNI has faced in the Roof Depot redevelopment. We decided to seek new initiatives, such as the Indigenous Food Network as additional ways to support healthier and more sustainable food systems. Stay tuned for more ways for our congregation to be engaged.

### Special events:

- --\$1000 to the Wopila Dinner hosted by All Nations Indian Church on Tuesday, November 25. OSLC was invited to fill at least one table at this event as they celebrate their building and the relationships that made this feast possible in their space.
- --\$1000 to a Takes-Giving Feast and Round Dance hosted by IPM at the American Indian Center on Thursday, November 27. IPM describes this as "a truth-telling event. We feed our relatives because... sharing food is an act of resistance and survival. Feeding people is sovereignty."

### Organizational Support:

- --\$6000 to the <u>East Phillips Neighborhood Institute</u> (EPNI) to continue their work in our neighborhood for environmental justice and a more sustainable and healthy community.
- --\$4000 to the <u>Indigenous Projectors Movement</u> (IPM) to support their work of healing and justice for our indigenous neighbors.
- --\$4000 to the <u>Indigenous Food Network</u> IFN is a program of Dream of Wild Health, a collaborative of Native-led community organizations in the Twin Cities (many of our Phillips/Ventura Village neighbors!) who are working together to rebuild a sovereign food system by identifying and leveraging organizational and community assets.
- --\$2000 to the Minnesota Immigrant Movement (MIM) and support their work empowering our immigrant neighbors.

### **Advent resource from Palestinian Christians**

Our brothers and sisters in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) have created a valuable resource for congregations and families for our use during Advent. The resources include a four-part Bible study featuring the stories and experiences of Palestinian Lutherans, which is appropriate for adults and youth. There is also an illustrated booklet available for download that offers an accessible story for the children in our congregation.

The materials were produced in collaboration with Sumud for Justice in Palestine and Israel, the ELCA's ministry addressing injustice in Palestine and Israel. (Sumud is the Arabic word for "steadfastness".) The resources can be found on the ELCA website by using the QRCode. ## The Law and Illegal Orders

The current news about the right/obligation to refuse illegal orders\* triggers some memories from the past Coming Home Collaborative Vets Ministry Roundtables. Those concerned about the souls of service members would gather in the OSLC hospitality room to hear a speaker and each other.

There were many stories of moral injury and also, occasionally, of moral courage. The moral injury stories are hard to speak, due to confusion, shame, and traumatic amnesia. One Vietnam veteran was shaking as he described the near assault on a building assumed to be full of combatants. They were just about to slam the building with destructive force when a woman came out with a white flag. Some wanted to shoot her as a Viet Cong, but instead she was allowed to communicate. The building turned out to be a school full of children. Decades later the vet was still troubled by what he and his comrades had almost done. I think that most of us present were aware that such "mistakes" (or worse) had been perpetrated too often in our wars.

Another veteran told the story of a comrade in his unit who was abusing Vietnamese civilians, acting like a thug. (Something seen in current ICE raids.) He told the thug that if the abuse happened again, the abuser could expect punishment from him. The abuse stopped. Around our table of listeners, there was a palpable sense of respect, even awe, with a tinge of regret. Many wished they'd had the courage to intervene to stop both unnecessary harm and the decades of moral injury consequences that followed.

Today we have had six members of Congress (Six) -- all with prior military or intelligence experience--publicly remind those under oath to the Constitution of their right and obligation to refuse illegal orders. I applaud them for intervening. This Six may have stopped not only harm inflicted by the state, but also the harm felt over later decades by the perpetrators. As Jesus noted: "They know not what they do." Unfortunately, too many people don't know they have a conscience until they've violated it.

Here in Minneapolis, we've highlighted the police "duty to intervene." Those entrusted by the state with the use of force to protect and serve have the legal and ethical obligation to stop the misconduct, excessive force, or constitutional violations by another officer. I am sure that those sentenced for the failure to protect George Floyd wish that they had been stopped <u>before</u> all the harmful consequences.

Now is the time to calmly review the law. The U.S. public is not an enemy against whom our military can use force to--purportedly --defend the U.S. public! Unfortunately, this highlighting of the law by the Six has resulted in serious threats of violence against them, including by the president. I invite you to call their offices in support (Information follows), to thank Sen. Amy Klobuchar for speaking supportively, and to urge Sen. Tina Smith to do so as well.

This is the season for thankfulness! I will also note the calendar synchrony with the awareness of the Nuremberg trials—where following orders was determined to not be a sufficient defense. Also, November 25 is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. Increased violence at home is one of the personally tragic consequences of having practiced violence against others.
