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Following the Star – Walking Another Road with the Magi

This week we celebrated the Feast of Epiphany. We remember the magi who followed the star to Bethlehem, knelt before the Christ child, and returned home ‘by another road.’ This phrase ‘another road’ is packed with meaning for us today, church. This other road in the magi story is the road of non-cooperation with evil and civil disobedience. They refuse to return to Herod to report Jesus’ whereabouts, as Herod had commanded them to do.

We are living in very troubling times. As I write this, there are reports coming in on my phone of neighbors being snatched out of their cars and off the street by ICE agents on Lake Street, just blocks from church. We are living through a reign of cruelty and terror right now. We see Herod-like behavior coming from the White House as political opponents are targeted, neighbors are ‘othered’ and dehumanized, and as a twisted version of Christianity is invoked as a tool for more greed and cruelty.

We are called to be like the magi. To follow the star – the guidance of our God – and to walk ‘another road’ – not the easy road, not the convenient road, not the road of avoidance or the off ramp of despair, but the way of the cross. We are called to follow Jesus with our hearts, soul, mind and strength. This has never been easy for the people of God, and we need each other to discern how the Spirit is calling us to use our gifts in this moment. This Sunday at the 9am adult forum, I invite you to join our conversation about how we are called to follow the star and walk another road in this moment.

As we continue to seek and guidance and good courage from our God, may we be inspired by the saints who walked as the magi did. Later this month we celebrate the witness of Dr. Martin Luther King. In his book, *Stride to Freedom*, he chronicles the story of the Montgomery bus boycott when 50,000 Black citizens together decided to walk ‘another road’ of non-cooperation with evil. He writes of how their struggle had a ‘divine dimension’:

“There is a creative power that works to pull down mountains of evil and level hilltops of injustice. God still works through history His wonders to perform.”

May God continue to give us good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that God’s hand is leading us and God’s love supporting us. Through Jesus Christ, our Savior, Amen.

Remarks from Interfaith Clergy Press Conference, January 8, 2026

Dear church, I wrote the above newsletter article before Renee Good was killed in our streets by ICE. I was grateful to be able to speak at a clergy press conference on Thursday with interfaith clergy. Here are my remarks:

My name is Martha Bardwell and I serve as Lead Pastor at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church here in South Minneapolis.

Today I am feeling heartbroken, for our community here in Minneapolis and for our nation. Right on this block, children who attend my church catch the bus every morning for school. But yesterday their block, their bus stop became a scene of terror. So this dear family I love is recovering from trauma today. And for these kids and kids throughout Minneapolis there are no buses today - there is no school today because we are doing what we need to do to keep them safe. To keep them safe from our own government. How messed up is that? I had to explain that to my own 8 year-old and 11 year-old children this morning.

This Sunday my congregation along with many Christian churches around the world will celebrate the baptism of Jesus Christ in the Jordan River. We will anchor our souls, our minds, and our strength in the story of God's beloved Son Jesus, and in our own baptismal call which is crystal clear: to love God, to love our neighbors as ourselves, to work for justice and peace, to serve all people following the example of Jesus. Every time we gather around our baptismal font, I as pastor get to address the congregation and ask them: Do you renounce evil and the forces that defy God? And the community responds with one voice: We renounce them.

Today we stand together across faith and race and culture as leaders in this community to say with one voice – we renounce this evil.

We reject government terror and government lies

We reject the violent tactics of this federal surge of ICE presence that has already caused loss of life – nobody – nobody should be shot while trying to stand with their neighbors.

We renounce this evil.

We need ICE out of Minnesota now. We need the officers involved in this killing to be arrested immediately. We need Congress to act and to hold this administration accountable for the reckless cruelty and unconstitutional actions of ICE.

And to all of us in this nation, no matter who you voted for – hear us crying out in Minneapolis today – and turn with us, with firm commitment, away from evil and towards the good.

We remember Renee Good today – and every time we say her name, may her name remind us, anchor us, in what our calling is here as people of faith and people of good will – we are called to choose the good, to work for the common good, to hold fast to what is good.

We need ICE out of Minnesota now, and until that day comes – we will not be intimidated. We will continue to push back against this reign of terror – as clergy, as neighbors, as elected leaders – as Minnesotans. We will stand together arm in arm.

And when our federal government sends agents of cruelty
we will be agents of care.

When they send agents of hate, we will be agents of love.

When they send agents of harm, we will be agents of healing.

We will be a surge of courageous love and nonviolence, for the sake of all God's children. Join us.






January Mission of the Month: Our Saviour's Housing

Our Saviour's Housing, a program of Our Saviour's Community Services (OSCS), provides emergency shelter and supportive housing to adults in Hennepin County.

Our emergency shelter on Chicago Ave (four doors down from OSLC) is open 24/7, 365 days a year. Guests at our shelter receive their own room, three meals a day, and support from our staff and volunteers.

Our permanent supportive housing program provides housing services and case management to those who have experienced homelessness and live with mental, chemical, and/or physical health conditions. For as long as we are needed, we support residents in affordable rental housing, on-site and scattered throughout Hennepin County.

During our 2024 - 2025 fiscal year:

- **109 guests** accessed our emergency shelter for one night or more.
 - ◊ 53 guests stayed at our emergency shelter as part of our medical respite partnership with Fairview Health Services.
 - ◊ 36 guests connected with our onsite mental health provider during their time at the emergency shelter, as part of a partnership with People Incorporated.
- 110 residents received ongoing support and case management in permanent supportive housing.
 - ◊ **10 residents** lived in our two on-campus properties operated by OSCS.

The biggest change our program experienced in 2025 was the remodel and expansion of our emergency shelter. After several months operating out of a temporary location this year, **our emergency shelter returned to Chicago Ave this past July**. This renovation made our building more accessible for our guests and expanded our capacity from 21 guests to 38 guests.

We returned to St. Paul's/San Pablo, greeted with welcome and song, and shared in a feast together! Our bellies filled with soup and tamales and pupusas, we danced to music in the sanctuary and cheered as children broke piñatas! It was a celebration rich with welcome, art, music, and relationship. Our Posadas experience continued as, led by Rebekah Fergus, the OSLC youth shared the story of Las Posadas with the OSLC congregation on Sunday, December 21st.

Sunday School Planning for Youth and Prayer

On Sunday, January 4th OSLC Sunday School teachers gathered with OSLC Lilly Grant Program staff to imagine what might be ahead for the winter and spring during the faith formation hour. Name, address, phone, birth date, baptism date, email and more. This information is part of what we have for each member at Our Saviour's. We store this in Power Church, the online system we use for member information and contribution tracking. As you can imagine, over time, the information becomes outdated. You drop your landline, you retire and no longer have a work phone number, or when you joined, we didn't get all the information we requested. We want to update our information so it's more accurate and it doesn't contain information that is no longer usable. Starting in January, we will be doing a pilot to determine the best way to have each household review and update your information. Once we determine the best methods to use, we will open it up to all households. You may wonder – what do we use this information for? We use it to create a church directory, it is used for reporting to the Synod, it's used to provide demographics, and it's used when we get requests for baptisms or when members transfer in or out. I will be reaching out to a variety of households during January for the pilot. Please consider helping to come up with the best way to do this. I will be attending the [Quality of Call Initiative](#) of the ELCA, part of the Presiding Bishop's Leadership Initiative, from January 12–14. This initiative was established to:

“Grow a church that is equitably served by people who are empowered to serve with their gifts, irrespective of identity markers that have historically been targeted by systems and individuals for bias, discrimination, and oppression.”

As part of Phase One, Region 3 (Minnesota and the Dakotas) was awarded a \$100,000 grant to promote quality call experiences for female-identifying and non-binary rostered leaders actively serving ministries in

the region. Approximately eight leaders from each of the nine synods in Region 3 have been invited to attend a Leadership Summit in Alexandria, MN, under the theme “Called to One Another: Cultivating God’s Kin-dom Together.”

I am grateful for the invitation and excited to gather with other Region 3 female and non-binary rostered leaders to connect, reflect on what a “quality call” looks like, and explore how we can support one another.

From January 29–February 2, I will also be attending [EXTRAVAGANZA](#) (EXT) in St. Louis, MO—an annual ELCA gathering for children, youth, and family ministry leaders focused on renewal, education, and connection. I am especially grateful to have received a scholarship to attend the [Network Multicultural Initiative](#), a pre-conference leadership gathering for leaders of color serving in children, youth, and family ministry. This community exists to support leaders in this vital work of the church and to strengthen our grassroots network through increased diversity.

While at EXT, I hope to meet with the EXT Learning Team to discuss the possibility of offering Kingian Nonviolence Training at EXT and at the 2027 Youth Gathering in Minneapolis.

ELCA Local Hunger Grant 2026

Thanks be to God, OSLC submitted the domestic hunger grant proposal this past December 2025. I am grateful to our Council, Outreach Table, and Pastor Martha for reviewing and approving the proposal. I would also like to thank OSCS Emergency Shelter and GMCC for agreeing to be our partners on this project.

The proposal, entitled Unhoused Voices, Hearts Awake, is a three-year grant of \$30,000 designed to listen to and hold regular caring conversations with our unhoused neighbors (up to 50 adults) who are experiencing trauma, grief, addiction, mental health challenges, and lack of housing. A wonderful addition to this grant is the involvement of our confirmation students, who will participate in the listening conversations and help serve breakfast to residents of the OSCS Emergency Shelter.

Please pray that this grant will be received positively so that we can be more present and supportive of our unhoused neighbors.

A Note from Pastors Martha and Esther about Fund Asks for Pastoral Staff

In a sermon, Pastor Esther mentioned that Pastor Martha had reached out to members to help her purchase a car last month. We wanted to provide transparency around our learning process and how we navigated this ask over the last month so that you can see how we as a community are moving forward with care and intention. Both pastors sent this note to members that Pastor Martha had approached:

Dear members,

Thank you for offering to assist with Pastor Esther's purchase of a car, and thanks for your patience over the holidays waiting for me to loop back!

OSLC executive council and personnel committee have clarified our policy around asks for funds for pastoral staff. The ELCA has a clear guideline against directly or indirectly soliciting members for special gifts for pastors. This boundary exists due to the power dynamics involved in pastor - lay relationships. Of course, pastors all have different life situations - and we are carrying this reality to the synod level for more conversation and imagination around how we can collectively support pastors as church together.

Neither Pastor Esther, personnel committee, executive committee, or I knew of this guideline before I reached out - we all have been learning and growing together. I celebrate our impulse for generosity as I am also grateful for clear boundaries that can help us maintain healthy, caring relationships.

Property Project and Capital Campaign Update

Pastor Martha

Our capital campaign is really taking off. Here are some updates:

- We are working on scheduling a first meeting for our steering committee, which will include both Paul Pribbenow (Augsburg University President) and Rev. Jim Bear Jacobs (Healing Minnesota Stories) as honorary co-chairs.
- We are also working on designing a logo and doing branding for the campaign. We have contracted with a firm who are helping us turn the tone and values of the campaign into visual language. Thanks for the name ideas you shared – those went in the hopper for them to work with. This is exciting!
- We are working on a legal agreement between Indigenous Protector Movement and us so that we can transfer the Green House to them in October 2026. We are likely to have a congregational meeting and vote about this land transfer sometime later this spring.
- One disappointment is that our project was not selected for MHFA funding this year. MHFA funding is critical for the overall viability of our project. We were told repeatedly that it would be surprising and rare if we got funding in this first attempt – as it usually takes multiple rounds to get funded. It does set our project back one year, as MHFA funding only happens once a year. We do not lose heart! If anything this makes us even more determined to keep up with our fundraising so we can have an even more competitive application for 2026. We have a stellar consultant, Andy Hughes, who is working with us to put together an even stronger application.

Please keep this project in your prayers. This project truly is so needed and is a vision of hope in these troubling times.

Abundant Life Retreat – January 30 – February 1

Three 7th and 8th grade youth from Our Saviour's will be attending the Abundant Life Retreat along with Pastor Martha at the end of this month. The Abundant Life Retreat explores healthy relationships and sexuality through a lens of faith. Held at Camp Wapo, the retreat is a collaborative effort between multiple Lutheran Churches in the Twin Cities and is led by a trained sex educator and local pastors along with adult chaperones from each church.

The retreats offer different content in a two-year rotation. One year will focus on "Faith and Sexuality" with workshops on sex and the Bible, the language and anatomy of sexuality, gender identity, sexual orientation, and addressing personal concerns about puberty. The other year will focus on "Faith and Healthy Relationships," with workshops on self-esteem, healthy relationships, consent and concern, and values-based decision making with an emphasis on social media and internet use.

A thank you to the Our Saviour's Community from Daniel Swenson-Klatt and Butter Bakery Cafe

As I retire and close Butter Bakery Cafe on December 31, I want to say thank you. I recognize that I am retiring from the daily operations of a business that has been a part of the life of this congregation for the past 20 years. I want to share my gratefulness for your love and support over the years.

Butter Bakery Cafe would not have even been a possibility if not for the community here that provided me with the inspiration, motivation, and encouragement to take the initial leap. You've been investors of your time, talents, and finances to make Butter Bakery Cafe a well-loved place in the heart of south Minneapolis. As a congregation, you were there at its start and I know that many of you will have been there for the December 31 Butter Ball Drop to count down to a new year and new chapter for beloved space at the corner of 37th and Nicollet.

Butter has been your meeting place, your caterer (including a lunch for Pastor Laurie Eaton as she was considering accepting a call here) and place to eat after Sunday worship until the pandemic impacts shortened the cafe's week. Pizza dough balls arrived for Bread Oven events, bars and sandwiches for funerals, and eclairs for the Easter Vigils - or, perhaps I could I say we held an Easter Vigil in the hope that eclairs would show up. Butter has been a donator of bakery goods for the Shelter program and a host for Language Program readings and events. The cinnamon biscuits made an appearance at a Synod Convention. Butter's original coffee brewer found a home at Wilderness Canoe Base. So many First Friday Men's groups and Wilderness Canoe Base guide reunions, and a Young Adult Group were held around the community table so lovingly donated to the cafe by Gladys Budd and Marie Svang. Eight members of the OSLC community worked at the cafe over the years. Butter Bakery's advocacy voice was strengthened through the work of Isaiah members from our congregation. The expanded mission into training young adults who have experienced homelessness was rooted in our shared ministry through the Shelter program.

At this time, I am still in the process of securing a next owner for the business and/or space at 3700 Nicollet. There are paths that might lead to something much like Butter and ones that would use the space for a different bakery business. The delay has been with efforts to deal with my business' Covid 19 Small Business Association loan. The SBA has been struggling with being understaffed and backed up by the recent shutdown, so I ask for your prayers that our government will come through and help this business transition reach its completion.

As my time with Butter ends and the business takes on new ownership, I am very excited to explore all the ways the community building and the well-loved recipes can continue on. It is my hope, that Our Saviour's will be a home to these activities and a place where the taste of Butter Bakery will still be found.

The life of Butter in the future years? It continues here among you.


The church is continuing the holy experiments related to hospitality.



Whatever happened to Peace on Earth?

“Whatever happened to Peace on Earth?” asked Willie Nelson in song a few years back. I remember how hypocritical the church of my childhood seemed as it sang of Christmas peace while supporting the American invasion of Vietnam. {Decades later, it’s clear that the US invaded Vietnam on lies and that the powers-that-be kept lying to Americans as we protested the bombing of civilians in N. Vietnam and neighboring countries-- along with other immoral atrocities. To this day, the children of those countries confront unexploded ordinances and toxic substances spread by our public treasure.}

The veterans of that moral injury mess have been carrying burdens in various ways ever since. Some sought to stop war at the time and some continue to this day. Veterans for Peace (VFP), for instance, in their Christmas message, invoked the truce started by troops in the trenches of WWI on Christmas eve {WWI resulted in the war deaths of 37 million and the Great Flu pandemic that killed over 50 million after infecting a third of the world:}

As veterans of war, we reclaim that history of the Christmas Truce in their name. As witnesses to and instruments of the brutality and dehumanization of armed conflict, we are no longer willing to be used to bring death, destruction, and suffering to others. We call on you to commemorate the Christmas Truce of 1914 with a determination to reconcile with enemies, to reconstruct and rebuild after war’s devastation, and to lay down arms.

We call on our active duty military comrades, National Guard, ICE and Border Patrol soldiers to recognize our common humanity, say ”I will cause no more suffering and harm to my sisters, brothers, their children. ” Understand that what you do today you will live with the rest of your life.”

As an adolescent, my favorite carol spoke of the Divine beckoning that inspires and empowers peacemakers. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow included these verses in I heard the bells on Christmas Day:

And in despair I bowed my head: There is no peace on earth,” I said,” For hate is strong and mocks the song of peace on earth, good will to all.”* Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: “God is not dead nor doth She* sleep: The wrong shall fail, the right prevail, with peace on earth, good will to all.” Till, ringing, singing, on its way, the world revolved from night to day, A voice, a chime, a chant sublime, Of peace on earth, good will to all!*

We who recognize and protest the insanity of war follow the beckoning of our Divine Mother who never stops believing in our divine/human capacity to collectively gain wisdom.
