Retreat Details

Location

We will meet at Dunrovin Retreat Center, located just north of Stillwater, about an hour from the Twin Cities. The address is 15525 St. Croix Trail N, Marine on St. Croix, MN 55047. More information about Dunrovin can be found at www.dunrovin.org

We will stay, gather, and eat in the main lodge. You are welcome to use the outdoors during free time for skiing, ice skating, and snowshoeing. Dunrovin is located on the woodland shore of the Saint Croix River, so there is beautiful outdoor space to enjoy.

Each individual will have their own room with a private sink. There are shared bathrooms and showers. If you do need an accessible room, please note that on your registration form.

Schedule

The retreat will begin with dinner at 6:00 pm on Friday, February 20. You are welcome to come earlier to settle in. On Saturday, we will have time for connection and free time. Our time together will conclude with morning worship on Sunday, February 22.

Cost

The cost of the retreat is \$300 per person.

This includes two nights of lodging, 5 meals, and materials. Scholarships may be available, please check with your pastor.

What to Bring

The dress is casual and meant to be a comfortable space to show up as yourself. There will be a packing list provided as we get closer to the date. Our weekend also includes free time and fellowship time, so you are always welcome to bring snacks and beverages to share and any hobbies that you enjoy.

Calvary Food Shelf is the Mission of the Month for February at Our Saviour's.

The food shelf is now operating in challenging times. It shows its resilience to get food to those who are food insecure.

We are located at 39th and Chicago Avenue. The space is very functional and allows the food shelf to continue serving the residents of Belfry Apartments and people from the neighborhood. Appointments are now scheduled 5-6 families or individuals every 15 min. This allows our shoppers to select groceries in a respectful manner.

Calvary Food Shelf now has the job of getting food for families who are afraid to leave their homes. Volunteers are delivering food on Tuesday and Thursdays. This is in addition to those that have appointments which number 85-95 families twice a week. Food deliveries are made on Tuesdays to shut-ins.

We welcomed a new director River Brokaw in September. This is a summary sent to all of Calvary staff and volunteers.

Since September:

60 pounds of food provided to each household when they visit in person

Distributed 106,000 pounds of food to the community since September

Offered additional food distributions totaling 8,000 pounds of food in George Floyd Square with no questions asked during the SNAP benefit shutdown

The volunteers have been delivering food to those sheltered at home. About 250 food packages have been delivered each week. We have health care workers, community organizers, teachers and neighbors coming to get food supplies for families in need.

The food shelf is unique in that fresh fruit, vegetables, proteins and dairy are offered. Eggs, milk, oil, spices,

salt are always needed.

Who would have thought that volunteers would need to monitor ICE agent activity to keep our customers safe. We have a protocol that is followed if ICE is in the area. Volunteers are the best. Always opportunities for volunteering.

The food shelf is primarily run by volunteers and there are opportunities for all ages to participate. The website has more information about the food shelf. calvaryfoodshelf.org. 

Manna and Mercy is a 100-page hand-printed paraphrase of the bible, from Genesis to Revelation -- a graphic novel of sorts, written by **Pastor Daniel Erlander** with imagination, clarity, humor, and cartoons. Built around the twin themes of food sharing and forgiveness, it helps us to look at scripture with new eyes and rediscover how it can become a means of life and grace rather than destruction and death.

The Bible is meant to be an instrument of God to enable abundant life for God's creation. Sadly, through the ages it has been read and interpreted in such a way that it has been used as an instrument of human domination and death—to cheer on the crusades, support slavery, advocate Apartheid, glorify genocide, sanction sexism, bless war and worship prosperity in the face of the poor, just to name just a few horrors of our human history.



Using Dan's *Manna and Mercy* book, South African pastor **Alan Storey** has developed a weekend retreat to take a fresh look at scripture through the interpretive lens of Jesus' life, death and resurrection and God's overall call for each one of us to partner with God in mending this fractured world. The hope is that after we have done so, our interpretations and use of the scriptures will be truly liberating and life-enabling for all of creation.


Helping our immigrant neighbors

The Spiritual Journey in These IC-E Times

Many of us are acting outside of our comfort zones as we seek to care for our neighbors. Particularly disturbing is when those caregivers are brutally killed –or otherwise hurt. Compounding the disturbance is that the harm is often perpetrated in public with zero accountability. Even worse is that we the caregivers are footing the bill for their outrageous signing bonuses, Delta flights, Hilton lodgings, and Enterprise car rentals.

I give thanks for our spiritual community in these times. It is so important that we remember who WE are.

Together we renounce these harms as contrary to the will of God, never accepting them. Together we affirm that children are precious; they deserve to go to school without fear, and that their bond with their parents deserves protecting. Together we affirm that life is precious.

And as we care for each other, we ask for divine help and guidance—and pay attention as it comes. I've decided to leave my angel Christmas decorations posted in place for the time being. They represent for me the Great Cloud of Witnesses connected to our Great Crowd of Witnesses showing up for our neighbors. We clearly need videos from multiple angles as we counter lies spread about our activities and purpose.

Imagine with me the angel wings on each one of the legal observers. We too have the capacity to flock and murmur as individuals swap out the lead.

Kudos to all who participated in whatever way in the Day of Prayer and Fasting for Truth and Freedom January 23. May our activities that day of cold clarity encourage others to stand against authoritarianism. And blessings be upon the caring legacy of Alex Pretti.

Kudos to the brilliant leadership of responding to his killing by gathering in neighborhood candlelight vigils.

My monthly article usually includes peacemaking action steps, and there are indeed many in circulation. Let me encourage you to ask for help in your personal extended circles of connection across the miles. Be sure that people away from our troubles understand what we are going through and resist as they can – so that they don't have to be next.

Pray for Pastor Martha, Bishop Jen Nagel, and other bishops and clergy from Minnesota and other states who are going to Washington DC on Wednesday evening to advocate with senators to urge them to stop defunding ICE. Pastor Martha will return Thursday evening, and the next day she will be taking youth and parents to the Abundant Life Retreat at Camp Wapo until Sunday afternoon. Pray for safe travel, meaningful visits and brave conversations.

Pray for Pastor Esther, who is heading to St. Louis, MO on Thursday to attend the Multicultural Initiatives and Extravaganza — an ELCA children, youth and family leadership gathering. Pray for a safe trip.

Pray for the families of Alex Pretti and Renee Nicole Good as they grieve the tragic deaths of Alex and Renee, both of whom were killed by federal immigration agents in south of Minneapolis. Pray for our city — its leaders, pastors, lay leaders, medical teams, educators, families, and children — for healing and resilience. Pray for ICE agents, that harm would be reduced, for an end to violence and weapons, and for justice to be served.

Pray for Alfred's surgery on January 28th as he has just recently been diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Irving Rodriguez, the son of one of the ELC staff who received a letter to be deported to Mexico. His court date is in April. Lawrence Johnson, Hawah Borbor's grandson who is detained in jail. Pray for Irving and Lawrence to be safe and to have positive legal representations.

Dr. Charlotte Cleavenger (Gauger) died this past Friday from complications of colon cancer. She is a friend of Liz Lewis's family. Liz's mom cared for Charlotte's children when they were babies (back in the 1980s!), and they have been part of Liz's family ever since. Please pray for Charlotte's family as they grieve and seek healing in this loss.

Rebekah Schultz who is slowly recovering from a hit and run in a bike accident. She ended up with concussion, two pelvis fractures and L5 vertebra fracture. She is now resting and recovering at home. Pray for healing.

Erik Hall's grandfather Lyle passed away. Pray for Erik and his family as they grieve and find comfort in God's love and tender.

Bob Hybben's mom Lois passed away peacefully. Pray for Bob, Suzanne Burke and Bob's family as they grieve and find comfort in God's love and peace.

Glenda's sister, Brenda is diagnosed with cancer. Pray that she can tolerate cancer treatments.

Angela !Khabeb has a fracture in her spine. Pray for speedy recovery and strength.

Karen Winans just had a fall. She is now home. Pray for speedy recovery.

Pray for our Somali and immigrant neighbors who are feeling fearful about their legal status and unsafe due to the current administration.

Rebekah Fergus' friend and business partner, Dan, recovering from a fall off a ladder.
