“Hold on, hold on, my dear ones - here comes the dawn”

-Song by Heidi Wilson

We have sung it in worship and in the streets – Heidi Wilson’s beautiful song, “Hold On.” At a recent reparations team meeting, Winton Boyd shared a video of the songwriter sharing the story behind this song. She wrote it in 2020 after a teenager named Finn who was much beloved in his small Vermont town died by suicide. She was invited to bring a song to the community gathering where people were coming together to support one another and the family in their raw grief. That night, she invited community members to gather in close around the fire, and she taught them this song.

The first time I heard this song, it was in a video of the very first Singing Resistance gathering out of San Pablo in our neighborhood, just days after Renee Good was killed by ICE agents. I know some of you were there, walking down our streets and pausing in front of homes where people had been abducted by ICE to share this song of love, comfort and encouragement.

It occurs to me that this song captures well the spirit of the season of Lent. As we walk together with our God, we are called to hold on to what is essential, and to let go of what is non-essential, life-draining, self-indulgent and opposed to Christ. We journey through this wilderness time not as a people without hope – we know Easter dawn is coming.

What are you holding onto this Lent? Here are some things I’m holding onto:

the promise of God with us in word and sacrament, song and life together;

the truth that God provides daily bread for each day – enough for now;

the power of neighbor-love active all around us and the ways we inspire and give courage to one another;

the gift of ‘dear ones’ to be in community with at Our Saviour’s and through our abundant partnerships;

my identity as a child of God – forgiven, loved and free;

songs of faith and resistance

I invite you to make your own “Hold on” list. May we all hold onto Christ, giver of abundant life, trusting that ultimately it is Christ who holds onto us. Thanks be to God.

March Mission of the Month: Community Emergency Service (CES) Food Shelf

Located at Franklin and 11th, CES serves the Phillips neighborhood – the most ethnically diverse neighborhood in Minneapolis - where 38% of the households live at or below the federal poverty level. OSLC has a long-standing relationship with CES.

CES reports that more neighbors are coming through the doors than ever before. Last fall approximately 460 neighbors were served in one day through the food market and lockers. In addition, 6,000 meals were delivered in one month to 290 seniors and people with disabilities through Meals on Wheels.

Families who once got by are now skipping meals. Seniors on fixed incomes are choosing between food and medication. The reasons are varied: skyrocketing rent, reduced federal assistance, inflation and unexpected layoffs. The outcome is an overwhelming surge in need.

At the same time, the resources to meet these needs are shrinking. Funding and food allocations are down by more than 30%. Items that CES used to count on like eggs, milk and fresh produce are now harder and more expensive to source. Private and public funding streams are tightening. Yet demand continues to climb.

The recent community crisis involving ICE operations has also affected food distribution. Clients are hesitant to visit the food shelf.

How has CES met this increased demand and community crisis? Food lockers, an innovative approach to serving clients, were installed last year. Lockers can be accessed at a time convenient for the clients. Food market hours were expanded, and a more efficient appointment system was initiated. Instead of 60 appointments/day CES now offers 100. That means seeing an additional 640 neighbors weekly. Appointments are scheduled Tuesday – Friday. Clients can visit the market 2 times/month. In addition, CES is working with Second Harvest to deliver emergency food boxes.

Our Saviour's support can help ensure that CES can continue to provide food, dignity and hope to their clients when they need it most. Here's how you can help.

Capital Campaign update

Our joint capital campaign with OSCS is plugging along in a ‘quiet phase.’ The ‘quiet phase’ means that the capital campaign committee is at work, having conversations with donors and foundations, inviting pledges, and making progress. This is all happening in a household-by-household way – not a ‘front page of the newspaper’ way. We will move out of the ‘quiet phase’ and into a fully public phase once we have raised 75% of our goal – which will take a while.

We have finalized a campaign name and logo, which I hope to share with you soon and very soon.

We are also working with a lobbyist, former MN Senator Patricia Torres Ray, who is helping us present a bill at the MN legislature this session for funding for our project. We are not at all certain that we will be funded – in fact, it seems unlikely – but it is part of a long-term strategy to get legislators familiar with our project and to pursue every possible avenue to securing support. Our own Senator Fateh is one of the bill authors.

I’ll add that Mike Huffman and I met with Mayor Frey a couple of weeks ago. The fact that he paused from a very busy schedule to hear about our project is significant. It’s clear that he and his staff see OSCS and this project as a key partner in addressing the housing crisis. Onward!



Stripping the veil off military intervention: a Lenten fast from lies

In this time of apocalypse (predicted in the Bible,) many of us are getting a taste of living under military occupation. One meaning of apocalypse is lifting the veils that obscure truth. This can be “world-ending” as the lies that secured our obedience are exposed.

During MetroSurge, people like me have been killed in plain view while doing nonviolent work, and thousands of “immigrant-looking” people have been seized, abused, and often disappeared far from home. Ordinary activity is terrorized. Vast amounts of our money fund these abuses while healthcare and education are cut. Those in charge refuse to hold killers accountable and instead lie about victims. Similar lies—on a larger scale—veil US military actions. As Aeschylus noted, the first casualty of war is truth.

Daily news shows blatant use of US military force for armed robbery of nations. Countries are threatened with “the offer you can’t refuse,” justified by claims about drug interdiction or WMD. While installing democracy is the excuse, installing oligarchs and butchers is often the result.

Look at Iraq. Lies about weapons of mass destruction justified massive US harm and deaths. A veteran told me he knew it wasn’t about WMD when he was assigned to protect oil production. Since the invasion, Iraqi oil revenue has flowed in US dollars through the New York Federal Reserve Bank, effectively placing Iraq’s budget under US control, with little accountability. The US has threatened to restrict those funds if Iraqis choose leaders it opposes. (Many expect something similar for Venezuela and Iran.)

In 2019–2021, Iraqis protested a system benefiting oligarchs and warlords instead of citizens. In the US, we heard little about the snipers and prisons that crushed them. Notice the through line of oil as hidden agenda. The gas fields off Gaza—now exploited by Israel—are also part of that horror.

The current administration downplays the climate destruction caused by war and fossil fuels. But people are lifting the veil. Those who profit from ignorance will try to stop us. I believe the rush to build data centers connects to thwarting popular will.

Mass surveillance is being tested. At least a billion tax dollars fund Palantir, an Israeli surveillance firm that, due to DOGE, has access to extensive federal data on citizens and the capacity for harm.

“Following the money” helps reveal who profits from others’ harm. Cryptocurrency avoids the limited controls on dollar flows. Both mass surveillance and cryptocurrency require data centers.

As truth is unveiled, may we use the power we still have to stop war at home and abroad. This is the holy work of loving our neighbor—not terrorizing or bombing them.

Actions recommended to check unchecked power:

Contact your MN legislators urging a moratorium on building data centers, which use vast water and energy.

Contact your federal legislators to stop threats or military force against Iran and Venezuela.

Show up for Palm Sunday Path actions.
