# **Learnings from Selma & Kingian Nonviolence Level 2 Training**

Esther and I had a phenomenal week at the Selma Center for Nonviolence, Truth & Reconciliation. We are now Level 2 Kingian Nonviolence (KNV) trainers! In my sermon on Sunday July 26, I shared some quotes and a story from our time in Selma. There's so much more to share, and I know we will be sharing more as we integrate our learnings into our ministry and life together. Here are some quotes that I am sitting with that I invite you to ponder.

From Bernard Lafayette III, son of Bernard Lafayette Jr. who developed KNV training:

"The objective is never humiliation; it is always transformation."

"When others look for enemies, look for possibilities."

"The world has no shortage of information; what is needed is formation."

"Seeds grow underground before anyone sees the harvest."

"Justice often advances one faithful decision at a time."

From Ms. Annie Pearl Avery, SNCC member and only person arrested on Bloody Sunday:

"Everything we did we did together, and we were always afraid, and we always helped each other."

From April Englund-Albright of Black Voters Matter:

"You can gerrymander a map, but you can't gerrymander a movement."

"The first step in any movement happens in your imagination."

"We will survive this; there is always a pathway to victory. And not all success depends on us. Look at the trees growing outside that you've never watered."

From Faya Rose Sanders and Hank Sanders, incredible Selma leaders, institution builders, and lawyers:

"Take what you have to make what you need." Hank's mom always said this and it was a powerful mantra as they built multiple institutions from the ground up.

From Ainka Sanders Jackson, Executive Director of the Selma Center for Nonviolence, Truth & Reconciliation:

"If we cancel the person but don't challenge the culture, we are not going to transform."

"Multiple things can be true at once."

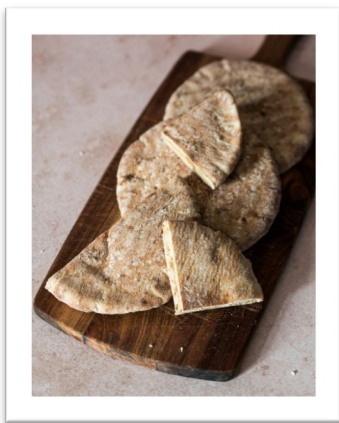

## **Women's Wilderness Adventure September 10-13, 2026 at Wilderness Canoe Base on the Gunflint Trail near Grand Marais Minnesota**

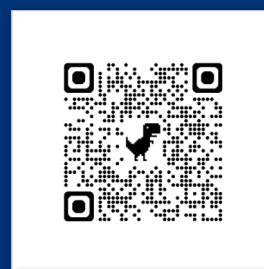

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# Stories from the Green Team Part 1: How Might OSLC Serve as a Resilience Hub?

Hello from the Green Team! We have been hard at work over the past year in support of OSLC's strategic goal to care for creation and support climate justice. This is the first of a series of articles sharing what we have been up to and inviting you to join the conversation. -Sharon, Ethan, Amy, Joel, and Pastor Martha.

Along with members of 9 other congregations, the OSLC Green Team spent nine months exploring how faith communities could help promote resilience in our communities. MN Interfaith Power and Light brought us together and led us in understanding how we might be a resilience hub. A resilience hub is a physical place that enhances the quality of everyday life, coordinates disaster planning and response, and engages in bottom-up climate resilience planning.

The OSLC Green Team held an adult forum in October 2025, completed nearly 50 conversations with community members and partners, completed a climate vulnerability assessment, and a community asset map. These are some of our findings from our community asset map:

*OSLC is unified in purpose and identity based on their mission and strategic goals, which help them prioritize tasks and make value-based decisions.*

*"Those strategic goals are real...People can do big things because of the community that is clear on its purpose"*

*OSLC provides spiritual care and grounding in values of love, grace, and nonviolence. The music and worship culture is rich and sustaining.*

*"I come to be nourished and remind me what kind of person I am"*

*OSLC has a culture of trust. The council trusts committees to make decisions, members trust each other, and rely on the church as a trusted source of information.*

*"There is real trust within our community"*

*OSLC pushes to make systems work. Members and staff have skills and connections in advocacy, community organizing, public policy, and story telling.*

*"A place to build collective power, which helps people fight against loneliness and powerlessness"*

*OSLC is networked with other churches, community organizations, and through their community organizing efforts.*

*"The network keeps us accountable and affirming"*

*OSLC is financially sound.*

*“We pay our bills”*

*OSLC is not only inter-generational, it has many multi-generational families as part of its membership.*

*“Kids and elders are both present. Historically that was intentional...the church very intentionally nurtured young adults and encouraged them to stay.”*

*OSLC is a regional church. This means not everybody is dealing with the same crises at the same time, usually.*

*“Most members are connected to their own hyperlocal response networks”*

*OSLC is committed to the Phillips neighborhood.*

*“We are the people who did not walk away from the neighborhood”*

*OSLC has many long-time members with institutional knowledge as well as many new people.*

*“I came and I stayed”*

*OSLC empowers people to share their thoughts and engage in community conversation in order to solve problems.*

*“We are not terrified of conflict”*

*The OSLC building is an asset, including the community garden and shared space with partners on the campus.*

*“The building is a huge asset. We wouldn’t exist today with our old building. This building is accessible and visible. The windows connect us with the community.”*

*OSLC has two pastors, who work well together, and work well with other staff.*

*“We all look to the pastors for support and leadership during hard times”*

We also learned about some areas of potential growth in our community, but we will save that for another day! The Green Team also learned about some the greatest needs in the Phillips neighborhood in the case of a climate emergency such as extreme heat, poor air quality, severe weather, or a power outage:

- Air conditioned locations that are easy to access by transit and open at night during extreme heat
- Locations with clean air during summer air quality events
- Neighborhood locations that have electricity in a power outage, such as to charge medical devices or

phones, and for refrigeration of medications

- Trusted messengers that can translate and disseminate emergency communications into all the languages of the neighborhood
- Transportation to and from needed services such as those listed above
- Increased tree cover to provide shade and reduce the effects of the urban heat island

One of the important considerations is addressing the differing needs of the different communities we potentially would serve. We are continuing to review our particular role in community resilience and welcome your thoughts.

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## **Members of Our Saviour's Lutheran - Hoop House Building Project**

As an action of our Reparations Team to find concrete ways to help build wealth for farmers of color, we have made a connection with a set of four Kenyan sisters who lease land just north of Loretto on Country Road 19. They currently sell their vegetables at the Kingfield Farmers Market and have contracts with Minneapolis Public Schools, 3M, and a few small restaurants.

They have two hoop house kits they hoped to have put together this summer. These high tunnel hoop houses help the sisters build capacity by extending their growing season and providing space to start and harden plants before moving them to the fields. With added capacity the sisters can begin to take on more contracts for their vegetables.

They made an arrangement with a contractor who has some experience with building this type of hoop house and was willing to set aside his time (and a couple of his workers) to complete the structures. Our volunteer time helps support the construction and helps this project move along more quickly. This means the contractor can offer a lower cost to the sisters for getting this built while still paying his workers a fair wage.

This summer has been especially hard for the sisters to find seasonal labor. The ICE occupation of the winter and the ongoing presence has meant many immigrant workers are just staying away and not working this summer. Our presence means a lot to the sisters and to the contractor and his workers.

Our presence also leads to conversations about Our Saviour's, it's mission and values, and is a witness to all who are connected to this farm. Because it is about 20 to 30 minutes outside of the city, it does require some commitment to keep up this relationship, but we hope that we can find many ways beyond the work of the hoop house building this summer to continue to support Calleen, Maggie, Jane and Pam as they seek to grow their farm.

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# FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS: Powerful Public Discipleship

The ISALAH core team at OSLC is presenting a summer discipleship series. We began our journey exploring the Power of Public Christian Witness on July 26. We explored Jesus' public ministry, the importance of discipleship in Christian witness today, and through history.

**Session 4: *Bearing Witness and Taking Action.*** This session the actual action being taken by our group. Time and details TBD.

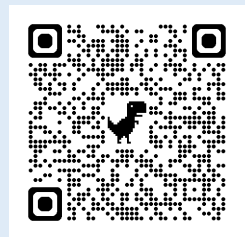

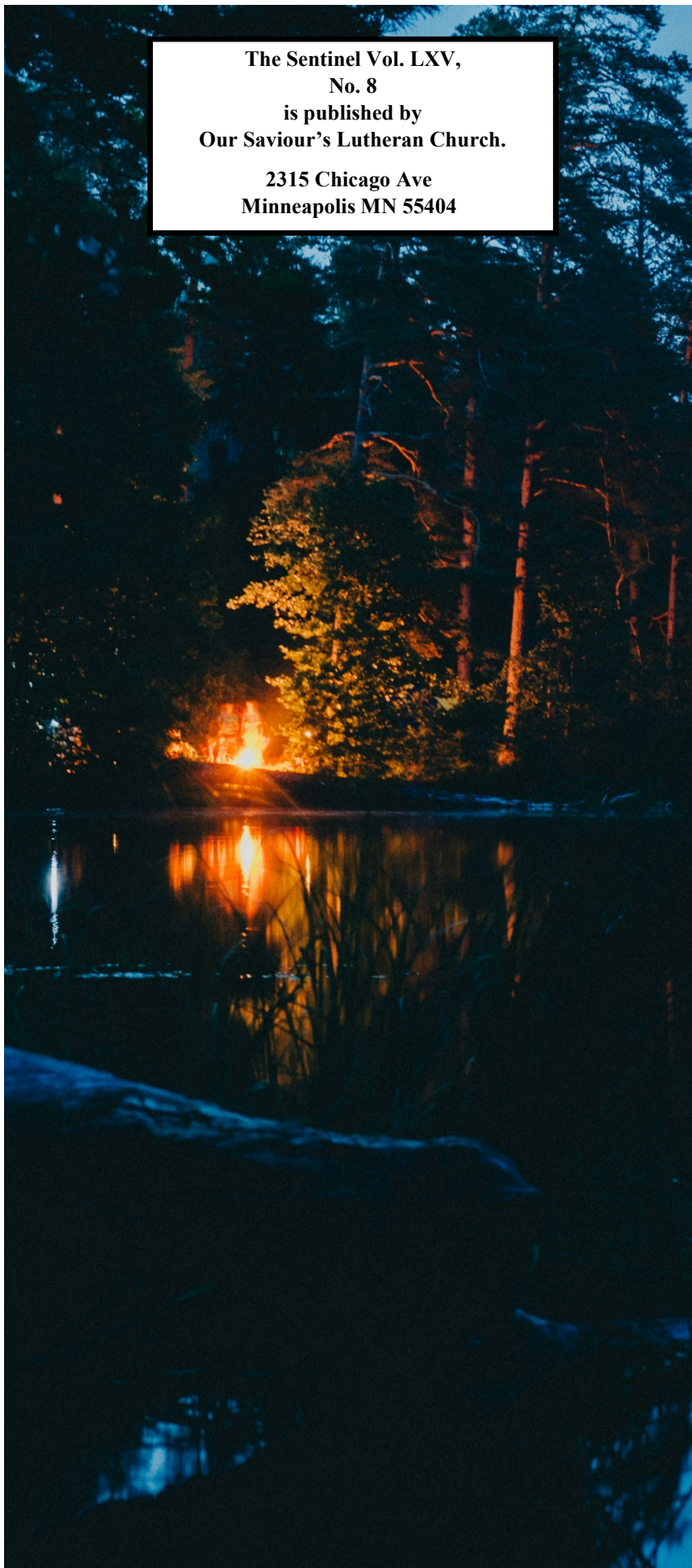
